Aim of The Course:

International Relations (IR) students, like in almost all other disciplines, are expected to write well written

research papers throughout their academic lives. The success of students' ability to write a good research

paper is one of the most important determiners of their current and future academic success. Therefore it

is crucial for students to develop their research writing skills to the highest limit.

This course aims to develop IR students much needed English academic writing and research skills in two

steps. First by developing their essay writing skills in English and secondly by introducing students how

to design and write an IR research paper. By following these steps, students will be able to both develop

an effective writing ability and also get familiarized with the basic concepts of research and methods such

as formulation of a good research question, a theory, hypotheses and data collection. Overall, the

objective of the course is to build a basic background in students who are later in their training expected

to write good research papers and to develop their general essay writing abilities in English.

Course Outcomes:

At the end of this course, students are expected to:

1) Develop English academic writing skills

2) comprehend the basics of research paper writing in IR

3) be able to formulate effective research questions, build hypotheses and conduct scientific data

collection

4) be able to organize and write a well written research paper in IR.

Method:

The instructor will use case studies, lectures, questions and exercises from the textbook and articles. This course will encourage students to be active in the learning process by commenting and discussing the

lecture notes and practicing the exercises in the textbooks.

Textbooks:

The course will not follow a main textbook, but a compilation of chosen articles and chapters of selected textbooks. The basic recommended readings of the course is as follows. Additional weekly reading list

will be provided by the instructor during the course.
